BE MODERN – Exploring Abstract Art Worksheet

Guidelines for educators

Context and the area of cultural heritage:

Digital cultural heritage, example from Belgium

Description and justification:

BE MODERN exhibition took place from 2 October 2020 to 21 February 2021. In order to offer more people the possibility to visit the exhibition even after it was officially closed, the organisers created an interactive and immersive digital exhibition. In this digital space you can walk through modern and contemporary art collections of the Royal Museums of Fine Arts of Belgium. BE MODERN gathers famous Belgian and international artists and it is a selection of 150 paintings, sculptures, works on paper, installations and moving images. Through this worksheet, students will get to know more about modern and contemporary art and its Belgian representatives. Students will be able to explore the exhibition, acquire related vocabulary, express their opinion and write a short review based on different artworks. In addition, contemporary artists often address the current (and historical) events which can initiate debate about the issues currently faced.

Duration: 45 minutes

Language level: B1



- Prior knowledge: It would be useful to see whether students have encountered contemporary art before. They should know basic phrases for expressing opinions, asking questions, and have the ability to write a short review
- Thematic area, grammatical and syntactical phenomena (learning objectives):

In this worksheet students will learn

- How to express their opinion regarding the art exhibition and art work and share their opinion with others
- How to write a short review (5-10 sentences) of an art exhibition using academic English
- Skills developed (or benefits for students):
- Creativity
- Writing skills
- Communication and collaboration with peers

EXERCISE 1: Exploring the virtual exhibition

(Duration: 15 minutes)

Task 1: Take a virtual walk through the exhibition. Write down short notes about you					
first impressions of the exhibition: what is the first thing you noticed when you					
began your virtual walk? Do you like the exhibition? Why/why not? (10 minutes)					tes)

Task 2: Share your notes with a partner and discuss the following questions (5 minutes):

- What do you think the exhibition is about? What do you see that makes you say that?
- Which elements of abstract art do you notice in this exhibition? As a helpful tip you can look at the definition of abstract art:

"Art that does not attempt to represent an accurate depiction of a visual reality but instead uses shapes, colours, forms and gestural marks to achieve its effect." (TATE, n.d.)

(Duration: 30 minutes)

Task 2: Asking for opinion: Get into groups of 2-3 and share your opinions. Use the following phrases (5 minutes):

- How do you feel about....?
- What are your thoughts on the exhibition/ abstract art/ colours used in the paintings?
- What's your opinion on abstract art?

Task 3: Choose a painting or sculpture that you like the most from the exhibition and write a short review about it. While writing the review, use the phrases mentioned above for expressing opinions (15 minutes).

Focus on these questions:

- What is the exhibition about?
- What did you like about the exhibition? What didn't you like?
- Take a look at the colours in chosen artwork. Why do you think the artist used these colours? What colour do you see the most in this work? What colour do you see the least?
- Why do you think this artist created this piece of art?

• Is it still art if it is not beautiful? Why or why not?

- Describe the lines and shapes that you see in the artwork. (For example:
 There are thin and curved lines on the painting).
- Is this artwork and the exhibition beautiful to you? Why or why not?
